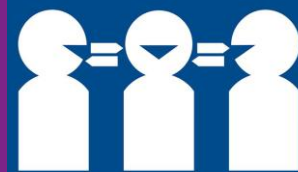


Let's Talk about Cancer

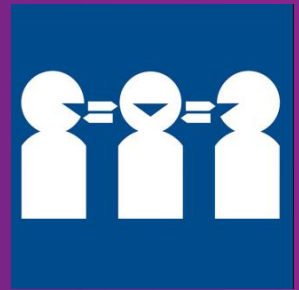
